- Recreational facilities at <50% capacity (gyms, public pools, etc.)
- Professional sports without audience participation (horseracing, baseball, etc.)

- Gather with no more than 5 people outside your household per week

Allow gatherings with no more than 50 people

Travel

Business/Employers

- Essential businesses open
- Existing construction that meets agreed upon criteria
- Landscaping
- Auto/RV/boat/ORV sales
- Retail (curb-side pick-up orders only)
- Car washes
- Pet walkers

- Remaining manufacturing
- Additional construction phases
- In-home/domestic services (nannies, housecleaning, etc.)
- Retail (in-store purchases allowed with restrictions)
- Real estate
- Professional services/office-based businesses (telework remains strongly encouraged)
- Hair and nail salons/barbers
- Pet grooming
- Restaurants/taverns <50% capacity table size no larger than 5 (no bar-area seating)

- Restaurants/taverns <75% capacity/ table size no larger than 10
- Bar areas in restaurant/taverns at <25% capacity
- Movie theaters at <50% capacity
- Customer-facing government services (telework remains strongly encouraged)
- Libraries
- Museums
- All other business activities not yet listed except for nightclubs and events with greater than 50 people

- Nightclubs
- Concert venues
- Large sporting events
- Resume unrestricted staffing of worksites, but continue to practice physical distancing and good hygiene

* High-risk populations are currently defined by CDC as: persons 65 years of age and older; people of all ages with underlying medical conditions (particularly not well controlled), including people with chronic lung disease or moderate to severe asthma, people who have serious heart conditions, people who are immunocompromised, people with severe obesity, people with diabetes, people with chronic kidney disease undergoing dialysis, and people with liver disease; people who live in a nursing home or long-term care facility.

Face Coverings



Where does the statewide requirement apply?

- *In indoor public settings,*
- *Outdoor public settings when six feet of physical distancing cannot be maintained with individuals who do not share a household (ex. public parks, trails, streets, and recreation areas)*

There are exemptions:













- People with certain disabilities or health conditions
- People who are deaf or hard of hearing
- Children under the age of 5 (ages 3-5 encouraged to wear a covering if possible)

Note- Business or govt agency is not forced to allow you inside. However, they should make reasonable accommodations.

Examples of accommodations include:

- ✓ Allow a person to wear a scarf, loose face covering or full-face shield instead of a face mask;
- ✓ Allow customers to order online with curbside pick-up or no contact delivery in a timely manner;
- ✓ Allow customers to order by phone with curbside pick-up or no contact delivery in a timely manner;
- ✓ Allow a person to wait in a car for an appointment and enter the building when called or texted; or
- ✓ Offer appointments by telephone or video calls.

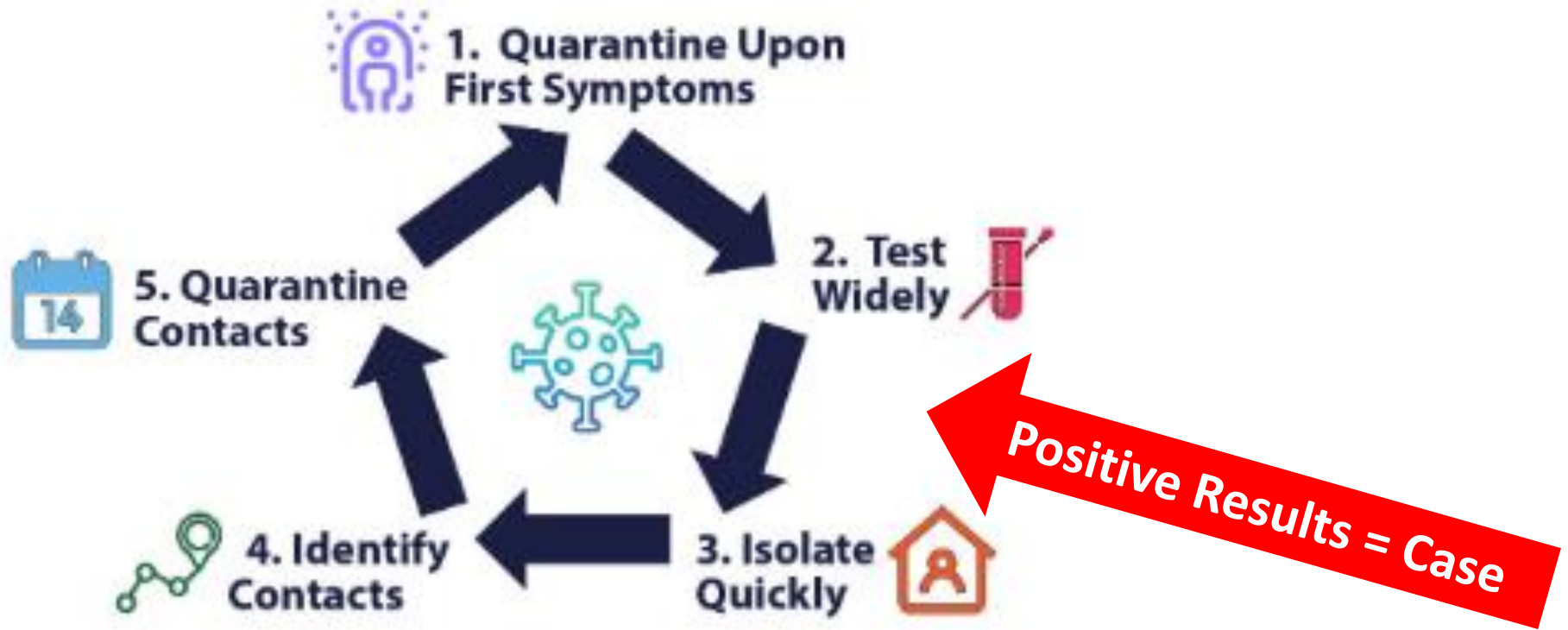

Positive COVID-19 Test: What's Next?

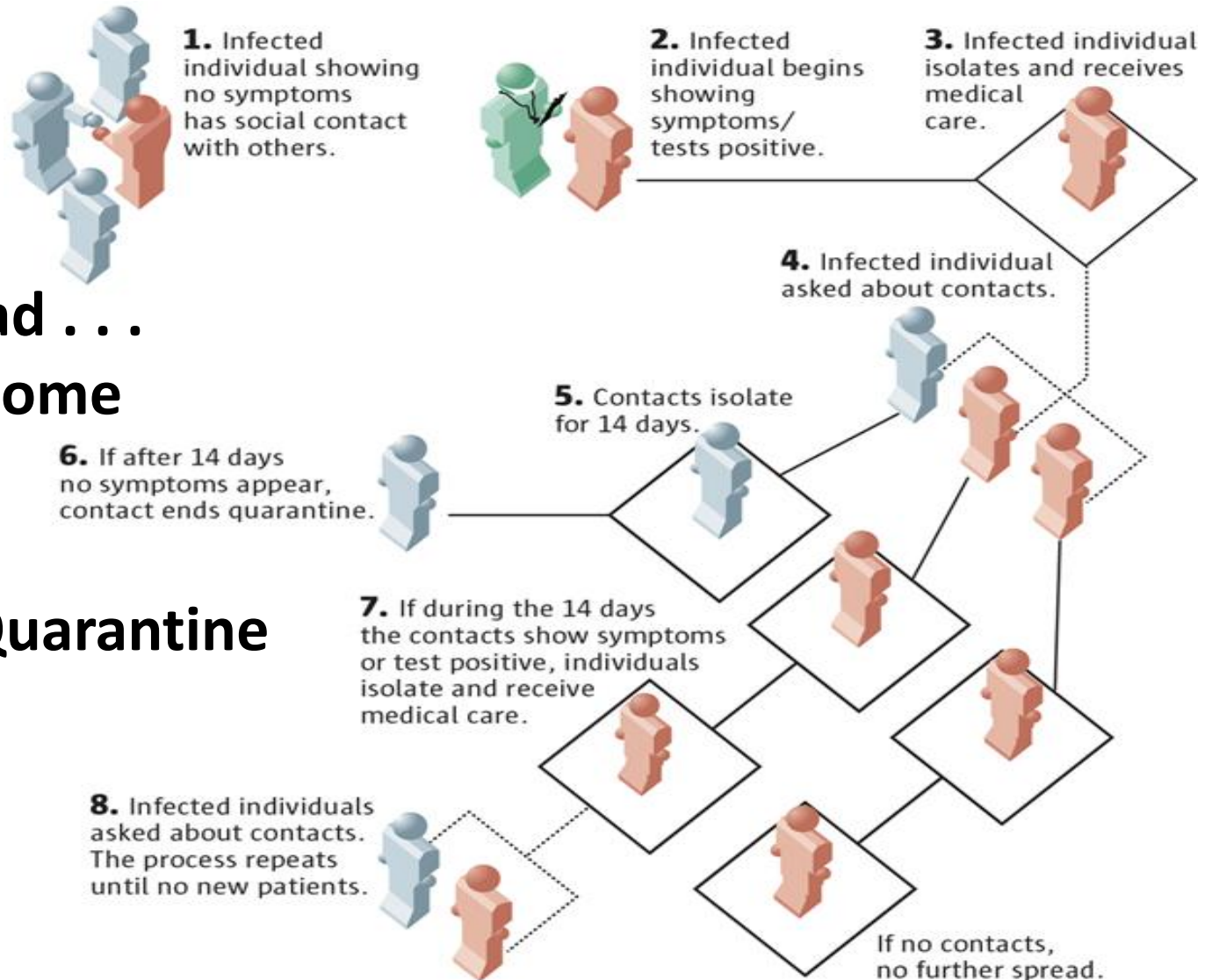


Case → Public Health

Positive COVID-19 Test: What's Next?

1. Case Identified (multiple methods)
2. Case contacted (phone) by a Public Health Nurse (10 days).
3. Case Interview (initial, follow-on)
 - A. Isolation Status
 - B. Your Health
 - C. Contact Tracing: Identify Close Contacts (household make-up, daily habits, travel, shopping, friends, etc.)
 - D. Case Management Support
4. Close Contacts Contacted (Testing, Quarantine) (14 days)
5. Daily Check-in (Active Case)

Stop the Spread . . .

- Sick, Stay home

4th of July

School Reopening FAQs

- 1. Do all students and staff members need to be screened for illness each day?** Yes. Both DOH and L&I require students and staff to receive a health screening before entering a school. DOH and L&I follow guidance from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), which allows for health screening to be performed at home before school or on-site
- 2. Are face coverings required to be worn at school by students and staff?** Yes. DOH requires everyone in a school building or on a school bus to wear a face covering, with specific exemptions identified in the guidance. 6. Can students use a face shield instead of a cloth face covering? Yes, though cloth face coverings have a superior ability to capture more droplets from speaking, coughing, sneezing, etc.
- 3. Is six feet of physical distancing required as part of a school reopening plan?** Yes. Districts must arrange their physical spaces to accommodate six feet of distance when all students and staff are seated.

Schools FAQ cont..

4. **What is the process that schools should take if a student or staff member is diagnosed with COVID-19? If a student or staff member is diagnosed with COVID-19, their family should notify the school.** The local health authority will advise the district on next steps, and it is likely that many of the other students or staff who were in close contact with the infected individual will need to self quarantine for 14 days.
5. **Are districts required to formally adopt their reopening plan? Yes.** School districts' boards of directors must adopt a reopening plan and then the district must provide it to OSPI and SBE no later than two weeks before the district's first day of school.
6. **Is there specific guidance on what the cleaning expectations are for after school each day and for buses after each run? Yes.** Information on cleaning procedures, including links to the CDC's recommended cleaning procedures, is available on pages 21–23.
