Clatsop County will move to Low Risk Category

Clatsop County will move to the State of Oregon's least restrictive category for state-mandated COVID-19 business and social guidelines beginning Friday, Feb. 26. The change will ease some restrictions on bars and restaurants and indoor recreation and entertainment establishments.

The state introduced the risk level metric in November to impose business and social restrictions based on each county's infection rates. Risk level categories are Lower, Moderate, High and Extreme, and the state re-evaluates each counties' status every two weeks.

Under the Lower Risk category, local restaurants and bars can offer indoor dining at up to 50-percent capacity. Indoor recreation and fitness establishments and indoor entertainment venues may also operate at 50-percent capacity. Faith institutions may allow attendance of up to 75-percent capacity. 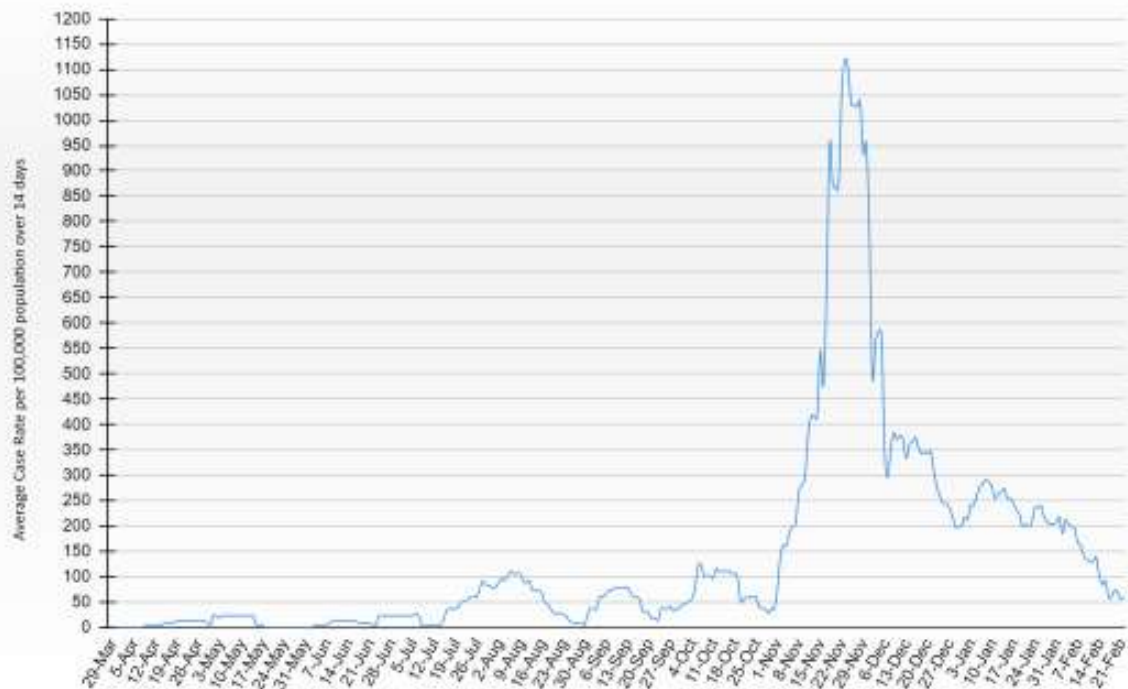

Pacific County Waitlist FAQs

How many people are left on waitlist?

There are about 290 people on the north county waitlist and about 978 people on the south county waitlist. Our staff have attempted to contact many of these people but haven't been able to get in touch.

Why haven't I gotten a call yet?

If you think you are on the waitlist but you haven't heard from us, email us at info1@pacificcountyhealth.com. You can ask us to update your information with multiple phone numbers or a phone number of a friend or family who can schedule on your behalf.

Who is eligible to be on the waitlist?

Only those who are part of currently open phases as set by the state. As of 2/9, that includes:

- 1A - Healthcare workers, EMS, and staff and residents of long term care.
- 1B, Tier 1 - Those over age 65, those over 50 who meet the definition of multigenerational

What if I'm not part of a group that's currently eligible?

Please do not sign up for the waitlist. We will release new waitlists for additional folks once new phases are opened up by the state. If you sign up for the current waitlist and you are not eligible, you will be removed.

Second doses FAQs

- **I got first dose at a different provider. Can I get my second dose from you?**

No. We can only order enough second doses to cover the number of first doses that we gave, so if you got your first dose with another provider you will need to get your second dose from that same provider.

- **When will I get my second dose?**

If you received the Pfizer vaccine, your second dose appointment will be 3 weeks later. If you received the Moderna vaccine, your second dose appointment will be 4 weeks later.

- **What happens if I miss my second dose?**

According to the CDC, the second dose may be administered up to 6 weeks after the first dose. If the second dose is administered after 6 weeks, there is no need to restart the series.

- **Can I mix vaccines (Pfizer and Moderna)?**

No. Your second dose vaccine must be the same as your first dose. These vaccines are not interchangeable.
