Updated DOH guidance documents. The following guidance for health care settings has been updated to align with recent CDC changes:

Outdoor Visitation Guidance for Long-term Care (LTC) Settings

- Visitors who are up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and who have been exposed to COVID-19 should not visit health care facilities until 10 days after onset of COVID-19 symptoms or 10 days after a positive test.
- Visitors not up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and who have been exposed to COVID-19 should not visit health care facilities until 10 days after COVID-19 exposure, or after 7 days with a negative test.

COVID-19/Coronavirus Visitor Announcement

- Visitors who are up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and who have been exposed to COVID-19 should not visit health care facilities until 10 days after onset of COVID-19 symptoms or 10 days after a positive test.
- Visitors not up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and who have been exposed to COVID-19 should not visit health care facilities until 10 days after COVID-19 exposure, or after 7 days with a negative test.

Supplemental Guidance for Long-term Care Facility Visitors

- Visitors who are up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and who have been exposed to COVID-19 should not visit health care facilities until 10 days after onset of COVID-19 symptoms or 10 days after a positive test.
- Visitors not up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and who have been exposed to COVID-19 should not visit health care facilities until 10 days after COVID-19 exposure, or after 7 days with a negative test.

At-Home COVID-19 Test Kits Available!

Pacific County Health Department in partnership with [Timberland Regional Library](#) and [Shoalwater Bay Medical Clinic](#) is pleased to announce the Pacific County at-home COVID test kit program. This program is in addition to the Washington State (www.sayyescovidhometest.org) and the federal (www.covidtests.gov) at-home test kit programs and is limited to those who live or work in Pacific County. Beginning today, February 9th, individuals can pick up one test kit per person at the locations listed below. Each kit contains 2 rapid COVID tests that people can administer themselves at home. We recommend everyone has a home kit on hand in case they develop symptoms of COVID-19 or in case they are exposed to someone who tests positive. For those testing due to exposure to COVID-19, it is best to wait until day 5 after exposure to ensure the most accurate test results. Please note, if you are currently experiencing symptoms and need a test, call the front desk of the location you are picking up at upon arrival and a staff member will bring the kit out to your car- Please do not enter the building if you are symptomatic.

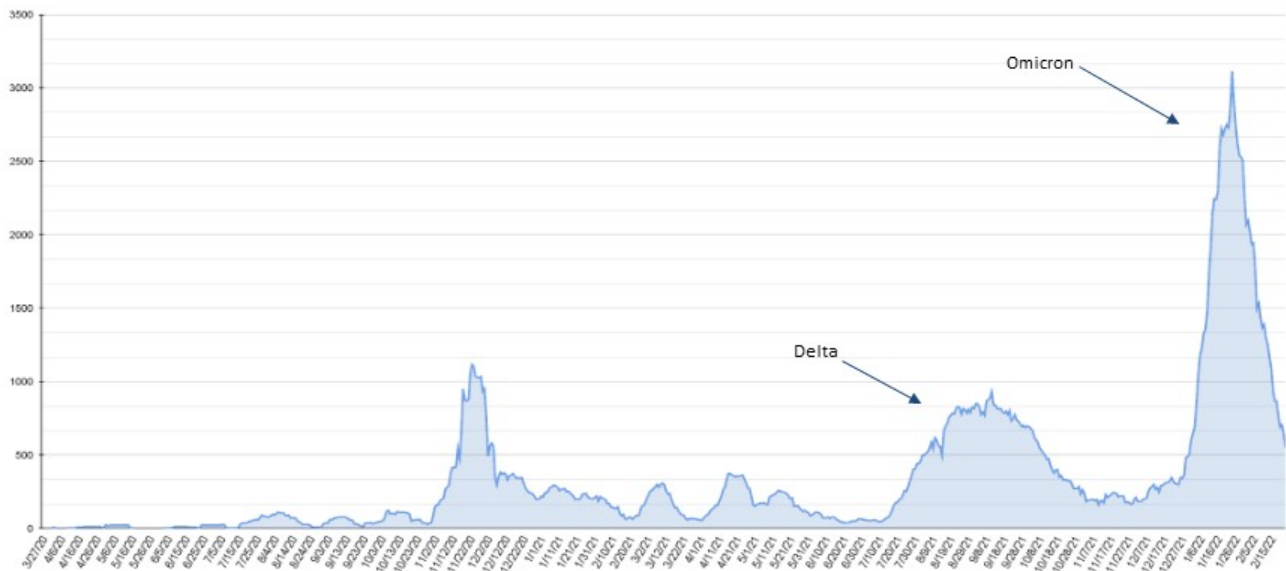

What to do if you are exposed to COVID:

IF YOU were exposed to COVID-19 and are NOT up-to-date on COVID-19 vaccinations (including boosters if eligible)

Quarantine for at least 5 days

- Stay home for at least 5 full days.

Get tested

- Get tested at least 5 days after close contact with someone with COVID-19.
- If you can't get a test and have symptoms, assume you are positive and isolate.

Take precautions until Day 10

- Wear a quality mask for 10 days while around others.

Avoid travel

Avoid being around people who are high risk

IF YOU were exposed to COVID and you are up-to-date on COVID vaccinations

No Quarantine

- You do not need to stay home, **unless** you develop symptoms.

Take precautions until Day 10

- Wear a quality mask for 10 days when around others.
- Get tested if you develop symptoms, or assume you are positive and isolate for 5 days.

Avoid travel

Avoid being around people who are high risk

IF YOU were exposed and had confirmed COVID within the past 90 days

No Quarantine

- You do not need to quarantine **unless** you develop symptoms.

Take precautions until Day 10

- Take precautions until Day 10.
- Wear a mask for 10 days when around others.
- If you develop symptoms, assume you are positive and isolate for 5 days.

Avoid travel

Avoid being around people who are high risk



What to do if you test positive:

For non-tested: If you are symptomatic or have been exposed to COVID and unable to get a test, please assume you are positive and follow the advice below.

Isolate at home, away from others.

- Isolate at least 5 days OR 24 hours after symptoms improve and no fever without fever-reducing medicine: **WHICHEVER IS LONGER**
- Day 1 of your isolation period begins the first full day after symptoms start.
- Continue to wear a quality mask while around others until day 10.

Reach out to your close contacts and let them know they've been exposed and they should quarantine.

- Quarantine for a minimum of 5 days from the last date of exposure.
- If no symptoms by day 5, quarantine can end but continue to wear a face covering and monitor for symptoms until day 10.
- If symptoms develop, get tested. If unable to test, assume you are positive & isolate.
- Close contacts include anyone you were around who is not fully vaccinated for more than 15 minutes while you were infectious (2 days prior to when symptoms started).

Wear a mask while inside and ask others in your home to do the same (preferably a KN95, KF-94, or a 3-ply surgical mask, if possible)

Ventilate your space as much as you can.

- If your home has an HVAC system, make sure it has a fresh filter. Consider using a HEPA air purifier if you don't have HVAC.
- Open the windows and doors whenever possible and safe to do so.
- Use fans to move virus particles from inside your home to outside.

Stay hydrated, use OTC medications such as acetaminophen to manage symptoms. Seek medical care if you display the following symptoms:

- Trouble breathing.
- Persistent pain or pressure in the chest.
- Confusion, inability to wake or stay awake.
- Pale, gray, or blue-colored skin, lips, or nail beds (or an abnormally low reading on a pulse oximeter, if you have one).

*This list is not all possible symptoms. Call your medical provider if you have any other severe or concerning symptoms.

COVID-19 Home Testing

When to use your COVID-19 At Home Test :

- If you have COVID-19 symptoms, like a fever or cough, test right away.
- If you were a close contact of someone with COVID-19, wait at least 5 days to test.
- If you are testing before a gathering, test right before the gathering, or as close to the event as possible.

*Do not report negative results.

While we don't require individuals to report their at-home COVID-19 test results, we highly recommend people to do so, and to let close contacts know about potential exposure. Your honest responses help us understand how the virus is affecting you and your community.

Home care for COVID-19: Guide for family and caregivers

 <p>Identify one household member to be the caregiver. The caregiver should have no high risk factors and the fewest contacts with people outside.</p>	 <p>Prepare a separate room or isolated space for the person with COVID-19 infection.</p>	 <p>Open a window(s) to improve ventilation and increase the circulation of fresh air.</p>	 <p>Do not allow visitors and try to avoid close contact (less than 1 metre) with the person with COVID-19 infection.</p>
 <p>Everyone should wear a medical mask when in the same room with the person with COVID-19 infection.</p>	 <p>Clean hands frequently using soap and water or an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.</p>	 <p>Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces, especially those touched by the person with COVID-19 infection.</p>	 <p>Use separate dishes, cups, eating utensils and bedding from the person with COVID-19 infection.</p>
 <p>The person with COVID-19 infection should rest, drink plenty of fluids, and eat nutritious food, continue any medication for chronic conditions.</p>	 <p>Take paracetamol/acetaminophen for fever and/or body pain according to instructions. Antibiotics are not effective against COVID-19 infection.</p>	 <p>Monitor the person with COVID-19 infection's symptoms regularly. Call your healthcare provider immediately if you see any of these danger signs:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Difficulty breathing • Chest pain • Confusion • Loss of speech or mobility 	

In some people there is a risk of more severe COVID-19.

High risk factors include:

- age 60 and over
- hypertension
- diabetes
- cardiac disease
- chronic lung disease
- cerebrovascular disease
- dementia
- mental disorders
- chronic kidney disease
- immunosuppression (including HIV)
- obesity
- cancer

During pregnancy, women over the age of 35, obesity, and chronic conditions are also **high risk factors**.

People who are infected with the **COVID-19 virus** and have any of these risk factors should be closely monitored by a health provider.

A pulse oximeter can be used to monitor oxygen levels.

- For people with **high risk factors**, check oxygen levels twice a day and report results to a health provider.
- Follow instructions on how to appropriately use the device.
- If the oxygen level on the screen is **less than 90%**, call for emergency help.
- If the oxygen level is **between 90-94%**, reach out to your health care provider for further guidance.
- For children, if the oxygen level is **less than 90%** plus a cough, difficulty breathing, inability to breastfeed or drink, lethargy or unconsciousness, or convulsions, call for emergency help.

Do I need a **BOOSTER?**

	Who's eligible?	When should I get a booster?	Which booster?
If you got... Pfizer	Everyone 12+ should get their booster dose.	At least 5 months after completing the primary series of Pfizer vaccine.	Adults 18+ can get a booster dose of any COVID-19 vaccines (Pfizer or Moderna preferred). Children 12-17 should get a Pfizer booster.
If you got... Moderna	Adults 18+ should get their booster dose.	At least 5 months after completing the primary series of Moderna vaccine.	A booster dose of any COVID-19 vaccines (Moderna or Pfizer preferred).
If you got... Johnson & Johnson	Adults 18+ should get their booster dose.	At least 2 months after completing the primary series of J&J vaccine.	A booster dose of any COVID-19 vaccines (Pfizer or Moderna vaccine is preferred over a J&J vaccine).
